A Message from our President

We can be so hard on ourselves sometimes. At least, I can be so hard on myself. And, as would be expected, I didn't gain this insight from actually looking at myself but by seeing others do it to themselves.

When working with students, I noticed some recurrent exclamations, such as "this is bad, I already know", "don't look, its awful". But was it actually bad? Should I really not have looked? Class would take on a very different format if I would follow their every suggestion. What I've learned is that my students are saying these remarks in judgement of themselves. Moreover, they are afraid I would judge them just as harsh as they judge themselves.

But if we end our observations with judgement, we would never learn. It is the critical reflection following our judgement where we learn *why* we think something is bad, or *what happened* that we now think it is awful. Just like we also wouldn't learn if we never ask why we think something is great, or what we did that made something awesome! As a teacher, I don't mind a bad or awful pot at all, and neither do I think a great pot is awesome – they are all just moments where we have an opportunity to ask questions, to be critical, to learn.

My self-judgement often prevents me from asking these critical questions. I judge my pots but don't question the why or how. I am very much looking forward to being critiqued by our juror David Lloyd and learn through the many views people have.

We are offering potters the opportunity to help us celebrate these values and explore how pottery and ceramics have a vital and illuminating role to play in our contemporary world.

Empty Landscape Masaomi Yasunaga

January 17 - March 29, 2020

The Libby Leshgold Gallery is pleased to present a solo exhibition of work by Masaomi Yasunaga, a ceramic artist based in Iga-shi, Mie, Japan. The exhibition is comprised of 98 pieces that are interstitial in nature -- existing somewhere between utile vessel and sculptural object, between formation and decomposition.

Although referred to as ceramics, Yasunaga's experimentation has led to a process that has removed clay and replaced it with glaze as the primary material element. In order to counter the fragility of the glaze and maintain their form during production, the objects are buried in trays of sand, soil, or rocks. Following their wood firing, they are disinterred in a process akin to archeological excavation, a reference that is further enhanced by the way they are installed in the exhibition on tomb-like mounds of rough gravel.

Though undeniably connected to the earth, there is something in the work that is also evocative of underwater archeological finds retrieved from a sunken wreck. As with things unearthed from either sea or land, or memories unearthed from hidden places, the work reminds us of the transformational nature of time, bearing both its

ravages and beauty. In a review for the Los Angeles Times, Leah Ollman described Yasunaga's work as "extraordinary objects, tactile things with insistent, engrossing physicality".

Masaomi Yasunaga received a Master's Degree in Environmental Design from Osaka Sangyo University where he studied under Satoru Hoshino, a proponent of the avant-garde ceramic group Sodeisha. He has exhibited extensively in Japan, but only recently had his first U.S. solo exhibition at Nonaka-Hill in Los Angeles. The exhibition at the Libby Leshgold Gallery will be the first time his work has been shown in Canada. The artist will be present at the exhibition opening.



Play with Clay: Drop-In Ceramics Workshop with Debra Sloan

(Participation is free with museum admission)

Join PGBC member, and past MOA artist-in-residence, Debra Sloan for an all-ages drop-in workshop that explores the narrative possibilities of clay.

At 12 pm, Debra Sloan will be begin the afternoon with a brief tour at of the Koerner European Ceramics Gallery, where Sloan's work is featured as part of MOA's new feature exhibition, *Playing with Fire:*Ceramics of the Extraordinary.

Visitors are then invited to drop into MOA's Learning Lab for an afternoon of all-ages fun. Discover and experiment with a variety of clay techniques, including press molding, carving, and painting. Then, take matters into your own hands by applying these techniques onto a ceramic tile that reflects your own story. Participants will then contribute their completed tile to a clay tiled stove, similar to the one exhibited in

the Koerner Gallery, as they help build a new collective story.

Debra Sloan is a Vancouver-based artist who is alumni of both the Vancouver School of Art and the Emily Carr University of Art + Design. She has exhibited with and served on a variety of boards throughout British Columbia, and her work has been exhibited and published nationally and internationally. In 2015, she was honoured with the Vancouver Mayor's Arts Award for Craft and Design. Working mainly as a figurative artist, Sloan was the first sculptor to have ventured in the sculptor/commentary direction at the Leach Pottery in its 95-year history. The entry period is January 3, 2020 till May 31, 2020. Finalists and Award-winning artwork will be exhibited at Mahon Hall in Ganges, Salt Spring Island, Oct 8 to 18, 2020, with the Awards Gala & Prize winners announced on Oct 17, 2020.

This is a waterfall spray booth so it has a sheet of water rundown down the back and is recirculated through a water pump. This helps keep glaze overspray down.

It also has a ventilation fan and ducting for additional safety (fan is the orange thing in the bottom and flexible ducting is the orange thing on top.

It also comes with a compressor for attaching a spray gun for glazed.
